Dear Parishioners:

Last Tuesday a group of parishioners met in the Church Hall in order to begin viewing the DVD series *Catholicism*, created and narrated by Father (now Bishop) Robert Barron, formerly a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago and now an auxiliary bishop in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, California. In the opening sequence, Father, in a beautifully scripted and wonderfully scenic setting, starkly confronts the major issue of Christianity: "Who is Jesus?". Is He like other religious leaders? No! Can He be domesticated? No! Is He the simpering person often pictured in religious art and on holy cards. Definitely not! What He demands is complete and resolute devotion. He is God walking among His people in the humanity of the carpenter of Nazareth.

The series opens in an intriguing place called Banias, which is in the Golan Heights of the modern State of Israel. Banias was developed by the Herod kings to please their pagan subjects as well as the imperial authorities in Rome. There was a large shrine there to honor the Greek god, Pan. Pan is often pictured with the hindquarters of a goat and the upper body of a human but with horns. He is often visualized playing a type of flute now called pan pipes. He was the god associated with shepherds, and wild rustic places. He was a free spirit and our modern English word "panic" derives from him. The nearest town, Caesarea Philippi, was also a Herod initiative. The place had a dual name to honor the emperor in Rome and one of the sons of Herod the Great.

To this remote region, Jesus takes the apostles and He questions them: "Who do people say the Son of Man {Jesus} is?" The apostles report that some folks think Jesus is a resuscitated John the Baptist or maybe one of the ancient prophets, like Elijah or Jeremiah, come back to life. Then Jesus gets to the point: "But you, who do you say that I am?" On behalf of the others, Peter answers: "You are the Messiah (the Greek word is "Christ"), the Son of the living God." For this affirmation of the foundational faith, Peter is given authority over the nascent Christian community. His profession will be the rock or foundation on which that early community rests. Jesus, while not denying His messiahship, tendered to shy away from the word "Messiah" because in His time it had political connotations.

The Gospel for this second Sunday of Lent strikes the same theme. Jesus ascends Mount Tabor with three of the apostles, Peter, James and John. He is transfigured before them. Matthew, throughout His Gospel, was anxious to illustrate that Jesus was the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies. Previously Matthew had pictured Jesus ascending a mountain to announce the Beatitudes as the fulfillment of the Law, which Moses had received many centuries previously when He climbed Mount Sinai to meet the living God. Now that same Moses appears with Jesus, as does Elijah, representing the prophetic tradition in Judaism. The point was not lost on the apostles - Jesus fulfills the Law and the prophets. Peter again immediately suggests building three shrine-like tents, one for each of the visionary figures. A bright cloud alights on the mountain and from it a voice identifies Jesus as "... My beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased. Listen to Him!" From the time of the Exodus, a shimmering cloud announced the divine Presence.

Especially in this Lenten season, we must ask: "Who Jesus is? And if our answer is in harmony with the answer of Peter and the Church, then what choice do we have but to listen to Him. This is God, Who created all things and Who led the people of Israel to become a magnet for all the nations. In the full humanity of Jesus, God strolls among us. If that is true then what He has to say, what He teaches and how He acts, are the words and actions of God in our midst, but in human terms. He is not simply another spiritual "guru". He isn't simply another spiritual leader among many. He is God among His people.

Lent is that season when we refocus our vision on what we truly believe about Jesus. Lent culminates in the Easter celebrations when that most unlikely Messiah is raised up and vindicated by God. If the Resurrection had not taken place, who would take seriously a messiah killed by His enemies? The question Jesus asked His disciples would be meaningless and Peter's answer all the more preposterous.


Food Pantry Hours are:10:00am-11:00am every Saturday

LENTEN REGULATIONS

Lent began on Ash Wednesday, March 1st, 2017. The **Lenten Regulations** are as follows:

Fasting is required on both Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (April 14th). Fasting is a serious obligation for all Catholics 18 to 59 years of age. The requirement reminds us of Our Lord's sacrificial love for us. It further reminds us of a our ultimate dependence on Almighty God for everything. It also unites us even if very briefly with the vast majority of the earth's population which often lacks even the basic nutritional requirements.

Abstinence on all the Fridays of Lent is also a serious penitential practice for all Catholics of all ages. Abstinence is the avoidance of meat or meat products. Like fasting, it is a reminder of our dependence on the love of almighty God and at least a brief solidarity with the poor.

All Catholics, after having received First Communion, are bound to receive the Lord in Holy Communion at least once a year. This obligation is called the Easter Duty. Most practicing Catholics receive the Eucharist regularly throughout the year so this obligation is more than fulfilled. The law applies a basic minimum and refers back to a time when Holy Communion was much less frequently received. However, if the recipient of Holy Communion is in a state of serious sin then recourse to the Sacrament of Penance is necessary.
