<u>MEMORIALIZE A LOVED ONE</u>

Dear Parishioners,

After the Resurrection and Pentecost, the apostles and their companions began preaching the Gospel, first to their own people, the Jews, and then the Gentiles. "Gentile" was an all-inclusive term, used by some in the Jewish community to designate those who were not Jews. Through the initiative of St. Paul and others outreach was soon made to the Gentiles, particularly those who spoke Greek. As of yet, there was no New Testament. In fact the earliest writings of what we now consider the New Testament were some of the letters that St. Paul addressed to Christian communities that he had founded. Normally the letters were written to clarify or correct some condition in those early communities. It is only later that Matthew, Mark, Luke and John composed the four Gospels for the Christian communities in which they lived.

So in its first years, the early Church relied on the Sacred Writings of the Jewish people (what Christians often call the "Old Testament"). They were partial to those "Books" of the Old Testament which seemed to point to the coming of the long-awaited Messiah. For that purpose, the prophet Isaiah was ideal. We will hear from him throughout the Advent season. Isaiah wrote much of his book in poetic fashion as did some of the other prophets.

However, this Sunday we hear from the prophet Baruch. Similar to Isaiah, his prophecy is not meant necessarily to be literal but rather to point to an idealized time when the reign of God would be supreme. Jerusalem is to remove her mourning clothes (Until rather recently people in mourning dressed in a particular style - usually adopting dark somewhat unfashionable clothing). The city of Jerusalem, symbolizing God's people is to dress in beautiful finery. She is to gather in her children because they are remembered by God, the Holy One. They were in exile (the Babylonian exile after the conquest of Judah by the Babylonians) but now they are brought home rejoicing. The highway will be leveled out in order to make the trip easier. Isaiah too uses this exact image. John the Baptizer (Baptist) will adopt it.

This Sunday the Gospel is taken from St. Luke. Of the four Gospel authors, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, only Matthew and Luke have "Infancy Narratives" which, from two different points of view, describe the events surrounding Jesus' birth at Bethlehem of Judea. In this citation, Luke jumps ahead to the beginnings of Jesus' ministry. He grounds his account in the historical scene. We discover Tiberius (adopted son and heir of the emperor Augustus) has been on the imperial Roman throne for fifteen years. Pontius Pilate, about whom we hear later in the Gospel, is already the Roman procurator in Jerusalem. The Romans, after the death of Herod the Great, assumed direct control in Judea and Jerusalem; however, Herod's sons were given smaller principalities in the area. We meet Herod (Antipas) tetrarch of Galilee. His brother, Philip, was tetrarch of Ituraea (near where the Herod family had originated) and Trachonitis. Lysanias was tetrarch of Abilene. (A tetrarch was the ruler of a fourth of an area - these four men ruled over fourths of the former domain of Herod the Great). Annas and Caiaphas are listed as the Jewish high priests. There was only one Jewish high priest at a time but these two are linked because Caiaphas was the son-in-law of Annas.

Among these historical grandees arrives a very different character, John the Baptist. Luke presents John as a preacher of repentance in order to prepare the "way of the Lord". He describes John by using the very words that Isaiah (and Baruch) had used. John symbolically will fill the valleys, level the mountains, straighten and smooth the roads so that "all flesh shall see the salvation of God". John is getting things ready for the arrival of the long-expected One. So are we!

Advent is a season of preparation. The obvious preparations for Christmas, the cards we send and the gifts we share are limitations of the gift God has given us. The luminous decorations celebrate the eruption of the God of light into our history. But we do more than celebrate the events of two thousand years ago. The Child born in Bethlehem, Emmanuel (God with us), is present now in the Sacraments, especially in Baptism and the Eucharist. By Baptism we were identified with Him. So we live our lives, as St. Paul urged the Philippians (2nd Reading), to "increase your love ever more and more...to discern what is of value so that you may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ Jesus..., filled with the fruit of righteousness....".

So in addition to the preparations for Jesus' birthday, we also celebrate His continual presence with us; we anticipate the termination of our lives when we meet Him face to face, and then we look ahead to the ultimate transformation of all thing when God is all in all.

Second Sunday of Advent Reflection

This week and next, our Gospel readings invite us to consider John the Baptist and his relationship to Jesus. John the Baptist appears in the tradition of the great prophets, preaching repentance and reform to the people of Israel. To affirm this, Luke quotes at length from the prophet Isaiah. John baptizes for repentance and for forgiveness of sins, preparing the way for God's salvation.

In today's Gospel we also note Luke's attention to the historical detail. Luke shows that salvation is for all people and situated in world events. Therefore, Luke lists the religious leaders at the time of John's appearance in the desert. Salvation is understood as God's breaking into this political and social history.

John's preaching of the coming of the Lord is a key theme of the Advent season. As John's message prepared the way for Jesus, we too are called to prepare ourselves for Jesus' coming. We respond to John's message by repentance and reform of our lives. We are also called to be prophets of Christ, who announce by our lives the coming of the Lord, as John did.
