Dear Parishioners,

I think that this week's Gospel is fairly self-evident. Two men have gone to the Temple in Jerusalem to pray. Their location was in the courtyards that surrounded the actual Temple building. The Temple, which was about the size of our parish Church, was reserved for the Jewish priests that ministered there on a rotating basis. The most sacred part of the temple was the Holy of Holies, in which it was thought that God's Name dwelt. Originally that cubic room had contained the Ark of the Covenant but about five hundred years before the birth of Christ, the Ark apparently had been captured and destroyed by the Babylonian conquerors. The room stood empty after that time. The courtyards surrounding the temple would have been the site of today's parable. One man, a Pharisee, filled with self-confidence in his own "righteousness", prayed in such a way as to distinguish himself from the rest of humanity, whom he describes as "greedy, adulterous, dishonest". Seeking an example for such behavior, he spies a nearby tax collector also at prayer. It almost sounds like the Pharisee is praising himself, not praying to God.

In contrast, the other man the tax-collector, does not even dare to raise his eyes to the sanctuary but admits his failures and his total dependence on God's mercy. The contrast between the two men is heightened by the fact that the tax-collector belongs to a class of people, who were generally despised because they made their living taxing their own people for the sake of the Roman conquerors or their local henchmen, the several Herodian princes. The Pharisee was thought to belong to a class that was right with God because they kept all the disciplinary regulations of the Law. Jesus' listeners would have had expectations for both Pharisees and tax-collectors; yet, as with so many of Our Lord's parables, they were in for a surprise.

It is the unlikely tax-collector whom Jesus praises as being justified in God's eyes. The tax-collector will be exalted while the supposed Pharisee will be humbled. The Pharisee has bragged to God about himself and has informed God of his righteousness (His "right" standing with God) as if God did not know the score. The tax-collector in deep humility does not dare to assume anything of God. He is fully aware of his short-comings, so he does no bragging but rather flings himself on the mercy of God.

The tax collector follows in the footsteps of the authors of the two earlier readings. Sirach was a teacher of the law. He lived at a time when the poor were despised and thought to be beyond divine consideration. Relying on the best of the Torah tradition, Sirach urges his students to imitate God, Who "hears the cry of the poor" (Psalm 34).

A section of St. Paul's letter to his protégé, Timothy, is our second reading. Paul, after his conversion, describes himself in various ways: an apostle, a servant, or a slave. In today's reading he describes himself as a libation poured in service to the Lord Jesus. A libation was a sacrificial liquid offering to a god. In many ancient religions, the libation offering would be poured on the altar or near it to symbolize the gift of this precious liquid to a god. Relying on imagery familiar to ancient people, Paul describes himself as "poured out like a libation". In more modern terms he also sees himself as a runner approaching the finish line after a good race. Paul's reward will not be the usual laurel crown given in ancient times to athletic competitors but rather "the crown of righteousness". He longs for the finish line in order to encounter the Lord, Who has stood by him in thick and thin and now awaits Him in His heavenly Kingdom.

The parable in the Gospel is addressed to those, who like the Pharisee think of themselves as righteous, while despising those they think are less so. The tax-collector on the other hand, recognizes his sinfulness, and throws himself on God's mercy. The Pharisee has exalted himself. The tax-collector has exalted God, the same God Who Sirach describes as esteeming the poor and Whom Paul fervently served with most of His adult life.
