Dear Parishioners,

This weekend begins Advent, the period of immediate preparation for Christmas. It also begins the new liturgical year. The readings for Advent almost inevitably have the theme of watchful waiting: living in the present but looking back to the past and anticipating the future.

Remember that wait for Santa Claus when you were child? So great was the expectation that you could hardly hold it. I was often convinced that I could hear the sounds of the reindeers' hooves on our roof (It was unlikely that the roof of our house at 69-11 Manse Street could have supported a "miniature sleigh and eight tiny reindeer"). All children were bursting with anticipation for the present, while remembering past Christmases, and looking forward to what lay ahead.

Some of those feelings we leave behind in childhood; yet, the readings this Sunday - the first of Advent - strike the same chord. Remember in Charles Dickens's *Christmas Carol*, Ebenezer Scrooge is confronted by a succession of the ghosts of Christmases past, present and future? Isaiah, Paul and Jesus set that same tone today.

Isaiah foretells the days that are coming when the Lord's promises will be fulfilled and all the nations will stream peacefully to the Lord's mountain. Many of the Old Testament prophets regularly criticized the people for their failures; yet, here Isaiah energizes the people with a vision of what could be a future of God's making beyond human dreams. God's dream had to be expressed in poetic terms but it lay far beyond any human language. Isaiah foresees a future, which we believe was fulfilled in Jesus' birth and life among us. That life, begun against all expectation in the manger of a stable, became the touchstone of human history and destiny. Who could anticipate such a thing?

In today's lesson from St. Matthew, we find that Child born at Bethlehem at the end of His human life. Jesus is directing the attention of His Apostles to the future when He will return as cosmic Lord. The language is apocalyptical - filled with a poetic expression of what is to come.

There is certainly a tension here between the lullaby of Bethlehem and the final ending. We are in the in-between times. So indeed the readings are couched in the past and look to the future. St. Paul in his letter to the Romans assures his readers that if they have conducted themselves to please God "...by putting on the Lord Jesus..." then they are living in the present as God would want them to. "For our salvation is nearer now than we first believed; the night is advanced, the day is near at hand."

In the Gospel Jesus warns the disciples to be prepared. He uses vivid comparisons between the time of the Great Flood in the past and the time of the coming of the Son of Man in an unknown future. People were going about their business with the ordinary things of life when the Flood burst upon them. He predicts that it will be similar when the Son of Man returns. His short analogies of people engaged in ordinary activities or a house owner alert to a possible robbery emphasize the suddenness and unknown time of that startling event.

We are not to be found unprepared. Unprepared for what? Well, probably not the final reversal of the "big bang" but certainly our own encounter with the living God! Advent is the season, when as we stand in the present, we look to the past - the birth in Bethlehem, the fulfillment of the ancient prophecies, and we anticipate the future, not only the celebration of Christ's birth on Christmas but His return in glory. We must be "prepared for an hour you do not expect, (when) the Son of Man will come".
