SACRAMENTS

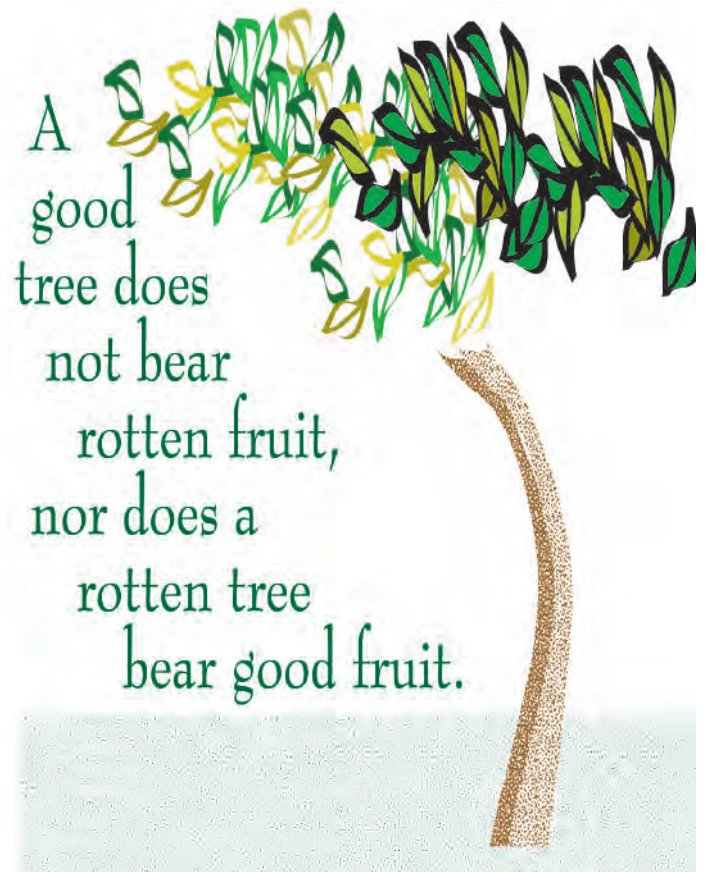

LENTEN REGULATIONS

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2nd, 2022.

The **Lenten Regulations** are as follows:

Fasting is required on both Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (April 14th). Fasting is a serious obligation for all Catholics 18 to 59 years of age. The requirement reminds us of Our Lord's sacrificial love for us. It further reminds us of our ultimate dependence on Almighty God for everything. It also unites us even if very briefly with the vast majority of the earth's population which often lacks even the basic nutritional requirements.

Abstinence on all the Fridays of Lent is also a serious penitential practice for all Catholics of all ages. Abstinence is the avoidance of meat or meat products. Like fasting, it is a reminder of our dependence on the love of almighty God and at least a brief solidarity with the poor.

All Catholics, after having received First Communion, are bound to receive the Lord in Holy Communion at least once a year. This obligation is called the **Easter Duty**. Most practicing Catholics receive the Eucharist regularly throughout the year so this obligation is more than fulfilled. The law applies a basic minimum and refers back to a time when Holy Communion was much less frequently received. However, if the recipient of Holy Communion is in a state of serious sin then recourse to the Sacrament of Penance is necessary.

LENT AT OUR LADY OF MERCY

Daily Mass is offered at 9:00am every weekday.

On Saturdays there is a 9:00am Mass and also a 5:00pm Vigil Mass for Sunday.

Our Sunday Mass schedule is 9:00am, 10:30am, and 12:00pm

Ash Wednesday, March 2nd, Ashes will be distributed during the 9:00am Mass, at a 12:00pm prayer service, and during the 7:30pm Mass.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is celebrated every Saturday from 4:15pm to 4:45pm in the Church. Additionally, the Brooklyn (and Queens) Diocese and the Archdiocese of New York (Manhattan, Staten Island and six upstate Counties) will sponsor a **Monday of Reconciliation on April 11th. Confessions in our Parish will be heard from 2:00pm to 4:00pm and then again from 6:00pm to 9:00pm**

Stations of the Cross with Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament will be celebrated each Friday of Lent at 7:30pm in the Church.

Monsignor McGuirl is planning to offer Bishop Robert Barron's excellent and inspiring **CD series entitled "Catholicism"** on the **Monday evenings of Lent at 7:30pm** in the Parish Hall (the exception will be the night of Reconciliation Monday). If you would like to upgrade your Faith, or even explore it more deeply, please join us. All are welcome!

April 10th is Palm Sunday and we will maintain our usual Saturday evening/Sunday Mass schedule. Palm will be distributed at each Mass.

In mid April we will publish our Holy Week and Easter Sunday Schedule.

May you all have a Blessed Lent!

PURGATORIAL SOCIETY

The **10:30 AM Mass on the first Sunday of each month** will be set aside for **Members of the Purgatorial Society. The Purgatorial Society enrolls a deceased loved one in twelve consecutive first Sunday Masses.** To enroll a deceased loved one in the Purgatorial Society we ask that a \$25 offering be made to Our Lady of Mercy Church, and their names will be entered in the Purgatorial Society Book in the Rectory. The names of the enrolled members will be printed in the bulletin in the month they are first enrolled only, and a complete list will be posted in the Church Vestibule. Please consider this as a way of remembering a loved one.

OLM WINTER BLOOD DRIVE
Parish Hall

On Sunday, 2/27 (8:45am-2:45pm) OLM will once again be sponsoring a winter Blood Drive for the New York Blood Center.

Even though hundreds of organizations have not returned to hosting blood drives, donations in December and January were the highest since the start of the COVID pandemic due to regional and national coverage of the national Blood Crisis. Hospital demand for blood (needed for emergency care and surgery) continues to increase beyond expectations while levels of blood donation have been below forecast. Blood supplies remain below the ideal five-day safety level, and types O-, O+ B- and A- continue to hover at less than two-day levels. The weekend snow storm two weeks ago resulted in 1000 fewer donations due to blood drive cancellations and lower donor turnout.

At every blood drive, several potential blood donors are unable to donate due to low iron in their blood when tested. In order to have as many donors as possible be able to donate, it is suggested that you increase your intake of foods high in iron (spinach, beans, peas, lentils, soybeans, pumpkin seeds, oats, potatoes, beef liver, sardines) several days prior to donating. Eligible donors: age 16 (with parent's signed consent form) to 76 years old and feeling well

Remember our goal of 60 to 70 units

To make an appointment, please go to NYBC.org. Use the Donate Blood tab (under the New York Blood Center logo) and when the drop down appears, click on Schedule Donation. Click on the Sponsor Name Search tab and then enter Our Lady of Mercy. Enter 02/27/2022 in both the Start Date and End Date boxes, and click on Search. On the next page, click on Schedule and when the next page appears, choose Whole Blood or Automated Red Cell (automated red cell is a double red cell donation) and then select your donation time.

You may also schedule an appointment by calling the Blood Center at 1-800-933-2566.

For the safety of the donors and Blood Center workers, donors must wear masks and observe social distancing throughout the entire donation process.

Remember to bring your donor card or your donor ID number, if you have one, and a photo ID on February 27th. Eat a good meal before donating and do not skip breakfast!

It only takes a little of your time. Please help save lives.

Dear Parishioners,

There is a story that at one point in her life, Mother Teresa of Kolkata, India, visited a shopkeeper in order to beg for bread. She was accompanied by a young boy, who was in the care of the Missionaries of Charity. This Congregation of Sisters was founded by Mother Teresa in order to work among the poorest of the poor. Though established in India, they are now found throughout the world.

Mother had gone on a begging mission to obtain bread for her charges; however, in response to her request the shopkeeper spit in her face. He apparently harbored a deep resentment toward Christians and especially Christians who gave such public witness. To this grave insult, Mother responded: "That was for me, now please bread for the boy!" She got the bread from the flabbergasted shopkeeper!

What Mother Teresa did was an illustration of this Sunday's very difficult Gospel demands: love your enemies, turn the other cheek, do unto others what we would expect ourselves, lend without expecting repayment and cease to judge others.

The first reading, from the Old Testament Book of First Samuel, gives another example. This book was written centuries before the birth of Jesus. Primarily from jealousy and also a degree of paranoia, the first Israelite king, Saul, had become a mortal enemy of David, who had been a trusted member of Saul's royal court. Despite being at war with Israel's perpetual enemies, the Philistines, Saul diverted part of his army to track down David and presumably kill him. At night when Saul's armed escort is asleep, David and his companion, Abishai, sneak into the royal compound and actually are able to approach the sleeping king. Abishai urges that they kill Saul and eliminate their enemy. David is repelled by the thought of killing "God's anointed" even though he could easily have done so. He does take the king's spear and water jug to indicate how close he had come to Saul. In the morning and from a distant hillside, David shouts to the king. Recognizing his own spear and jug, Saul realizes how easily David and Abishai could have killed him. David's act of mercy even to his enemy results in at least a temporary truce between the two men. David in the course of his life would fail very dramatically, but this incident recalls the type of mercy and justice demanded by God.

Luke's Gospel was probably addressed originally to a Christian community composed of folks from a non-Jewish background (i.e. Gentiles). In Luke's world this Gospel message shocked people. Ancient Mediterranean culture had an honor/shame system. To be slapped was a source of shame and you were expected to retaliate. In that social scheme, people only lent to those from whom they could expect repayment. A good deed would be repaid by a similar good deed but nothing more. This is what was expected and to a great degree still is. Yet Jesus teaches the opposite.

Years ago Mother Teresa met the late Princess Diana here in New York City, where both had gone to visit a settlement house. They died within weeks of each other and I believe that it was the *Daily News* that featured a cartoon on their editorial page that pictured the two - one very tall, the other quite diminutive - holding hands as together they entered the gates of heaven. Neither were perfect. Mother could be quite demanding and insistent. The foibles of the Princess are fairly well known. Yet Mother Teresa is a canonized saint and for all we know Princess Diana also stands before the Throne of Mercy. In compliance with the demands of today's Gospel, it was their service to others that brought thousands of people into the street for their funerals.

Neither the Princess nor Mother Teresa were perfect. Our Lord's Apostles were far from perfect. Later incidents in his life showed King David to be far less than perfect. He was an adulterer, who colluded in the death of the husband of his lover! The author of the second reading, St. Paul, was not perfect.

You and I are not perfect but for reasons best known to Himself, God our Father through Jesus has called all of us to be His emissaries and ambassadors. As disciples of Jesus, we are called to do what He did. And Jesus tells us: "Give, and gifts will be given to you, a good measure ...will be poured into your lap. For the measure with which you measure, will in return be measured out to you" (Luke 6:38).

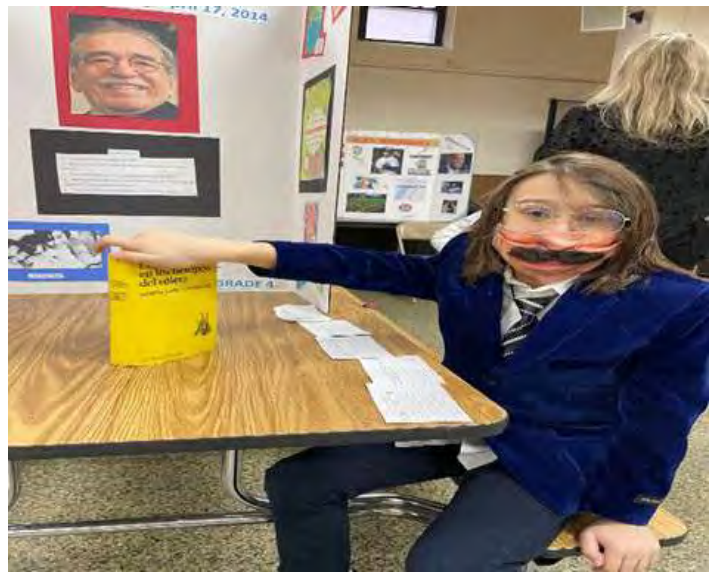
